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
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
Ol ABOUT THE BLACK CATHOLIC FORMATION PROGRAM



In ecclesial settings where unity is valued over uniformity, black Catholic spirituality has been fruitful in areas of evangelization, pastoral ministry, social justice, Christian initiation as well as communitybuilding initiatives that respond to the particular needs of the black faithful and others seeking God. Given the hidden, yet provocative, history of black Catholics in the United States, it seems that it will take a supernatural intervention of the Holy Spirit to bring black culture into earnest dialogue with the Catholic faith such that the church can actually incorporate black spirituality and other gifts in the conduct of its evangelizing mission while bringing to bear the moral authority of the Gospels to challenge and uplift the lives of black members of the body of Christ.

With this program, the Philadelphia Office for Black Catholics, inspired by the words of Dr. Bellows and challenged by Archbishop Perez, has integrated Black Catholic spirituality with Catholic faith formation. The Black Catholic Formation Program aims to deliver catechesis in Catholic theology, trace Black Catholic history, explore Black Catholic spirituality, and evangelization. The courses within this program are in conjunction with St Charles Borromeo Seminary, which will handle all registrations. Courses will be taught in parishes throughout the Black Catholic community.

This Black Catholic Formation Program is named after Sister Bea Jeffries, SBS, who throughout her life and ministry never failed to teach Black Catholicism. Her ministry is the genesis of this program.



COURSES IN BLACK CATHOLIC SPIRITUALITY

Our program focus is how Black Catholics know God, worship God, and walk with God in our daily lives.

HBCS

The History of Black Saints and Black Catholics up for Sainthood in the U.S.

A Brief Description of the Course: This course will expound on the lives of six African Americans up for sainthood and two Africans named saints in modern times. We will discuss Catholic solutions to the problems these saints faced and the impact of their faith on the lives they led and those who encountered them while they were alive. This course will also cover the process of sainthood in the Modern Church.

Class Meeting: 1 1/2 hour class, 1 night per week for 8 weeks

NT New Testament

A Brief Description of the Course:

This course was developed for the Catechetical Institute at St Charles Borromeo seminary. It is taught in a video and discussion format, with an accent on Black Catholic traditions. It is an overview of the New Testament

Class Meeting: 1/1/2 hour class, 1 night per week for 8 weeks

PJ Person of Jesus

A Brief Description of this Course:

This course will give an overview of Jesus' divinity & humanity. The history of his life and ministry will be included. Since this class was developed for the Catechetical Institute of St Charles Borromeo Seminary, it will be taught in a video and discussion format.

Class Meeting: 1 1/2 hour class, 1 night per week for 8 weeks

WEBC

Witness! The New Evangelization from a Black Catholic Perspective

Brief Description of this Course:

The purpose of this course is twofold: to be formed more deeply in your friendship with Jesus Christ (discipleship) and to be equipped with the skills for helping others come to encounter Jesus' great love for them (mission).

Class Meeting: 1 1/2 hour class, 1 night per week for 7 weeks

MMBC

Music and Movement in the Black Catholic Community

A Brief Description of this Course:

This course "Music and Movement in the Black Catholic Community" explores the significance of music and movement in Black Catholic spirituality. It delves into the historical context and traditions of music and movement in the Black Catholic Church, the role of music and dance in worship, and the integration of music and movement as forms of prayer. The course also covers challenges and solutions in integrating music and movement in worship and emphasizes embracing music and movement as integral aspects of Black Catholic spirituality.

Class Meeting: 1 1/2 hour class, 1 night per week for 8 weeks

GBC

The Gifts Black Catholics bring to the Catholic Church.

A Brief Description of this Course: Black Catholics bring a wealth of unique gifts to the Catholic Church, enriching the faith community with their rich cultural heritage, spiritual traditions, and communal values. Their deeprooted faith, resilience, and commitment to social justice serve as a powerful example for the broader Church.

Embracing diversity, advocating for inclusivity, and striving for racial justice and reconciliation within the Church are some of the vital contributions that Black Catholics bring, echoing the powerful message of Sister Thea Bowman.

Class Meeting: 1 1/2 hour class, 1 night per week for 8 weeks

CSI Sacraments of Initiation

A Brief Description of this Course:

This course was developed for the Catechetical Institute of St Charles Borromeo Seminary. In it, students will learn and discuss the initial Sacraments of the Church, their spiritual meaning and practice. It is taught in a video discussion format.

Class Meeting: 1 1/2 hour class, 1 night per week for 8 weeks

CTP Coming Together in Prayer

A Brief Description of this Course: This course explores the significance of prayer in the Black Catholic tradition. It delves into the historical context of prayer in the Black Catholic Church, the incorporation of African spiritual elements in Catholic prayers, the role of prayer in shaping Black Catholic identity, and the importance of communal prayer gatherings. The course also covers the role of prayer in Black Catholic worship services, the connection between prayer and social justice, and strategies for cultivating a vibrant prayer life within the Black Catholic tradition. It emphasizes the power of prayer, communal prayer, prayer intentions, prayer in action, building community, and expressing faith.

Class Meeting: 11/2 hour class, 1 night per week for 8 weeks

SHV Sacraments of Healing and Vocation

A Brief Description of this course: Our Catholic faith teaches about the healing power of God and about our calling and vocations in life. This course will explore what God's healing entails and the process through which our vocations are realized. This course will be given in a video and discussion format, as it was developed for the Catechetical Institute of St Charles Borromeo Seminary.

Class Meeting: 1 1/2 hour class, 1 night per week for 8 weeks

HBC1 History of Black Catholics 1 & 2

A Brief Description of this Course: The history of Black Catholics in the United States is a fascinating and complex story that spans centuries. From the early days of colonial America to the present, Black Catholics have faced unique challenges and made significant contributions to the Church. The story of Black Catholics in the United States is one of perseverance, faith, and resilience in the face of adversity. It is a story that deserves to be told and remembered for generations to come.

Class Meeting: 1 1/2 hour class, 1 night per week for 8 weeks (both parts)







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WHY DO I NEED TO STUDY MY FAITH?
